Now, in the spring of 2021, there's a new feeling of hope. We're thrilled to be moving forward with our new Executive Director, Jim Welsh, at the helm.



STATEWIDE COLLABORATIONS AND PROJECTS

- Family Voices of California (FVCA) is a Family to Family Health Information Center of the U.S. Maternal Child Health Bureau. SFCD serves as the coordinating agency for this coalition of California parent centers working to improve policies and systems of care for children with special health care needs. FVCA is a member of a national Family Voices movement. SFCD coordinates FVCA's annual Health Summit and Legislative Day as well as its **Project Leadership** that trains family members in advocacy.

LOCAL COLLABORATIONS AND PROJECTS

- Special Needs Inclusion Project (SNIP) provides training and support to help after school programs create positive inclusive experiences for all children.
- Help Me Grow brings together families, health care providers, and early educators to ensure that all children receive developmental screenings in early childhood, and that those who need it receive access to early intervention services.
- Mission Promise Neighborhood.
 Support for Families is a member of this collaboration that is building a comprehensive, integrated framework of evidence-based services in San Francisco's Mission District aimed at student achievement and family economic security. SFCD provides developmental screenings and links to early intervention services.

EDUCATION, RESOURCES, & SUPPORT

Education activities at SFCD include parent-professional workshops, parenting programs, small group clinics, parent panels, and activities for Inclusive Schools Week. In addition, Community education and outreach activities feature teams of parents and staff presenting to classes, organizations, and professionals about disability issues and the experiences of families.

SFCD workshops remain a popular service for families seeking to obtain information and build their skills. Families and professionals suggested many of the topics for these activities, which are designed to address the needs of children at different stages of life and to focus on a wide range of concerns and questions.

A few examples of 2020 workshops are: What is an IEP and How Can it Support My Child's Learning?, Asking the Right Questions Transition to Adult Services, Disability, Discipline and Mental Health, Positive Parenting, Understanding Due Process, Social Security Overpayments, Limited Conservatorship, Emotional Safety and Boundary-Setting, Talking With Your Kids About Sex and Sexuality— and many more.

Meanwhile, weekly small-group clinics on Transition to Adulthood and the IEP in English, Spanish, and Support for Families provided **256 education events** in 2020 with a **total attendance of 3,528** parents, youths, and professionals.

Cantonese continued to offer more individualized help for families. Simultaneous translation for workshops and on-site childcare make it easier for families to attend all our events. When we switched to online programming in response to the COVID-19 pandemic, we no longer provided childcare but continued to offer interpretation. Our attendance actually increased as we pivoted to online programming.

The annual spring Information and Resource Conference in collaboration with SFUSD was fully planned but had to be cancelled due to COVID 19 "shelter in place" orders which came on March 9, just one week before our planned event. We had planned a full day of educational activities with 27 workshops, an assistive technology demonstration center, and 77 exhibitors.


The Triple P — Positive Parenting Program® is a 12-week evidence-based family support system designed to prevent — as well as address — behavioral and emotional problems in children and teenagers, including those with special needs. Twelve families completed the full program this past year.



OUR FAMILIES

Children with special needs and their families come from all walks of life and all income levels. Because Support for Families has no eligibility requirements, we can respond to families of children with any kind of disability or special health care need — and even when families just have a concern. The data below is from the **2,139 (unduplicated) parents and caregivers** who had consultations with a Family Resource Specialist and/or attended a Support for Families workshop, support group, or event in 2020.

OUR FAMILIES BY AGE OF CHILD WITH A DISABILITY




OUR FAMILIES BY RACE/ETHNICITY


OUR FAMILIES BY PREFERRED LANGUAGE

In surveys following Support for Families workshops and events...


- 95.2% of participants agreed or strongly agreed the workshop they attended increased their knowledge of their child's needs and/or resources.
